 - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
 - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Katahdin Woods and
- 5 Waters National Monument Access Act".

6 SEC. 2. DEFINITIONS.

- 7 In this Act:
- 8 (1) AUTHORIZED ACQUISITION AREA.—The
 9 term "authorized acquisition area" means the des10 ignated area outside the boundary of the National

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Monument depicted as "Authorized Acquisition 1 2 Area" on the map entitled "Katahdin Woods and 3 Waters National Monument Proposed Boundary Ad-4 justment", numbered 686/193,181 and dated March 5 2024.6 (2) NATIONAL MONUMENT.—The term "Na-7 tional Monument" means the Katahdin Woods and 8 Waters National Monument in the State of Maine 9 established by the Proclamation. 10 (3)PROCLAMATION.—The term "Proclama-11 tion" means Presidential Proclamation Number 12 9476, dated August 24, 2016 (54 U.S.C. 320301 13 note). 14 (4) SECRETARY.—The term "Secretary" means the Secretary of the Interior. 15 16 SEC. 3. ACQUISITION OF ADDITIONAL LAND FOR NATIONAL 17 MONUMENT. 18 (a) BOUNDARY.—The boundaries of the National 19 Monument shall be the boundaries established by the 20 Proclamation. 21 (b) ACQUISITION.— 22 (1) IN GENERAL.—Subject to paragraph (2), 23 the Secretary may acquire, by purchase from a will-24 ing seller, donation, or exchange, land or interests in 25 land within the authorized acquisition area.

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1 (2) PROHIBITION ON USE OF EMINENT DO-2 MAIN.—Nothing in this Act authorizes the use of 3 eminent domain to acquire land or an interest in 4 land. 5 (c) TREATMENT OF ACQUIRED LAND; BOUNDARY ADJUSTMENT.—On acquisition by the Secretary of any 6 7 land pursuant to subsection (b)— 8 (1) the land shall be included in the National 9 Monument; and 10 (2) the boundaries of the National Monument 11 shall be adjusted accordingly. 12 SEC. 4. ADMINISTRATION OF NATIONAL MONUMENT. 13 (a) ADMINISTRATION.—The Secretary shall administer the National Monument (including the land added 14 15 to the National Monument under this Act) in accordance 16 with— 17 (1) this Act; 18 (2) the Proclamation; and 19 (3) the laws generally applicable to units of the 20 National Park System.

(b) HUNTING, FISHING, AND OUTDOOR RECREATION
ON ACQUIRED LAND.—The Secretary shall allow hunting,
fishing, or any other outdoor recreation activity on land
acquired pursuant to section 3(b)—

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1	(1) if that activity was in existence on the day
2	before the date of acquisition of the land; and
3	(2) consistent with the management of that ac-
4	tivity under the Proclamation.
5	(c) Collection of Fiddlehead Ferns.—
6	(1) IN GENERAL.—Subject to paragraph (2),
7	the Secretary shall allow the gathering by hand of
8	fiddlehead ferns (Matteuccia struthiopteris) in the
9	National Monument for noncommercial personal use
10	and consumption by the general public.
11	(2) LIMITATION.—If the Secretary determines
12	that the gathering of fiddlehead ferns (Matteuccia
13	struthiopteris) under paragraph (1) may adversely
14	affect resources of the National Monument, the Sec-
15	retary may limit the gathering of fiddlehead ferns
16	(Matteuccia struthiopteris) under that paragraph in
17	accordance with applicable regulations.
18	(d) PUBLIC EDUCATION.—In accordance with the
19	mission of the National Park Service, the Secretary shall
20	collaborate with local communities and Tribal govern-
21	ments to educate the public regarding the natural environ-
22	ment and history of land management in the National
23	Monument, including the shaping of that landscape by Na-
24	tive communities and practices, successive generations of
25	timber management, and other activities.

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(e) FORESTRY.—In accordance with the management
 plan for the National Monument, the Secretary may con duct such noncommercial timber harvests as the Secretary
 determines to be necessary.

(f) PROTECTION OF EXISTING ACCESS.—Nothing in
this Act affects valid existing rights, including existing
rights of access through the National Monument for the
removal of timber outside the boundaries of the National
Monument.

10 (g) Public Safety.—

(1) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary shall provide
to the public appropriate safety education and notification materials to ensure safe interactions between
visitors and logging trucks, equipment, and operations on roads in or adjacent to the National
Monument.

(2) PROCEDURES.—The Secretary shall collaborate with affected stakeholders to establish procedures to meet the needs of visitors to the National
Monument, logging and trucking operations, and
other users of roads in or adjacent to the National
Monument to ensure safe interactions between active
logging operations and visitors.

1 SEC. 5. ADMINISTRATIVE SITES AND VISITOR FACILITIES.

(a) IN GENERAL.—To facilitate the administration of
the National Monument, the Secretary may acquire, by
purchase from a willing seller, donation, or exchange, not
more than 10 acres of land or interests in land, including
improvements, for the administration of the National
Monument and visitor services outside the boundaries, but
within the vicinity, of the National Monument.

9 (b) AGREEMENTS.—The Secretary may enter into
10 agreements with State of Maine, units of Tribal or local
11 government, or private entities—

12 (1) to carry out this section; and

13 (2) to develop a cooperative information center14 for the National Monument.
